

### **NEW MAYOR PRO-TEM**

Congratulations to the new Mayor Pro-Tem Councilman Eric Howard. Eric was elected by citizens in November 2017 to serve on the Valdosta City Council representing District 4. His first term began in January 2018. He was re-elected to serve a second term in November 2021 and was sworn into office on January 6, 2022. His current term will end on December 31, 2025.



# THE NEW INTERIM CITY MANAGER

The City of Valdosta Mayor and Council appointed Deputy City Manager Richard Hardy as the Interim City Manager effective on February 1, 2023. Hardy fills the vacancy left by City Manager Mark Barber, who retired after 35 years.

He has served as the Director of Public Works for the City of Valdosta, Georgia, since September 2014. He is a 33-year Department of Defense Veteran and a retired Chief Master Sergeant (CMSGT) of the United States Air Force (USAF).

Hardy holds a Bachelor of Science in
Occupational Education from Wayland
Baptist University and a Master of Science
in Information Systems from American
Sentinel University. He received his
Certificate of Local Government
Management by completing the
Management Development Program
from the University of Georgia, Carl Vinson
Institute of Government.

He has also completed seven tiers of Professional Military Education focused on Leadership and Management.





The Stormwater Division of the Engineering Department was happy to receive a much-needed upgrade to the existing Watergoat serving Sugar Creek. This upgraded installation is equipped with larger marine-grade buoys and a double-row configuration to catch floatable debris and litter more effectively. It's important that the community works together to keep the rivers and streams clean.

Here are some ways people can help:

- Throw the beverage container in the nearest trash can.
- Secure any loose trash in a truck bed.
- Ensure household trash is safely contained in the trash can at the road during pickup day.
- Instruct commercial/residential landscapers to pick up litter on the property during routine grounds maintenance.









A fantastic collaboration with the City of Valdosta's Engineering Department and WWALS Watershed Coalition is Suwannee Riverkeeper provided litter clean-up along the creek beds of Two-Mile Branch and Berkley Drive. This is a great example of how dedicated our community members are to keeping Valdosta beautiful. Here are a few ways to reduce the output of trash and help the environment, some of which include:

- Reduce your use of single-use items like plastic bags, straws, and water bottles.
- Recycle properly by separating recyclables from non-recyclables and disposing of them in designated recycling bins.
- Donate or sell items you no longer need or want instead of throwing them away.
- Opt for reusable items like shopping bags, water bottles, and containers.










### **BIG GAME BASH**



#### **Arbor Week**

On February 17, 2023, the City of Valdosta was honored by the Georgia Forestry Commission as a Tree City USA for its 37th consecutive Year at the annual Arbor Day Celebration, sponsored by the Valdosta Tree Commission.

Mayor Scott Matheson proclaimed Arbor Day at City Hall, and a tree-planting ceremony was held at Scintilla Charter Academy to honor Valdosta's status as a Tree City USA community. The designation as a Tree City USA signifies Valdosta's ongoing commitment to growing and maintaining a healthy urban forest.

The Valdosta Tree Commission gave opening and closing remarks at the event and led the prayer. Georgia State Forester presented the Tree City USA flag, held by Scintilla Charter Academy students. Before the ceremony, the City of Valdosta's Arbor Division planted a Willow Oak in the playground. The ceremony concluded with City Leadership, the Georgia State Forester, Scintilla's staff, and students shoveling dirt onto the tree.

To coincide with Georgia Arbor Day, the Azalea City Woman's Club recently honored Ms. Jeanette Coody by planting a tree through the Valdosta Tree Commission's Memorial Tree program. The planting of this tree commemorates her 100th birthday and celebrates her contributions to our community.

Ms. Coody chose Fire Station Two as the location to plant her Summer Red Maple because she is a passionate supporter of our Valdosta Fire Department.



### Valdosta Fire Department



Valdosta Fire Department honored early firefighters with a Push-in Ceremony on Friday, March 24, 2023. The ceremony commissioned its newest 2023 Sutphen Fire Engine 8 and placed it into service.

Fire Chief Brian Boutwell began the ceremony by explaining its tradition and history, saying that it dates back to the 1800s when horsedrawn apparatuses had to be pushed into the bays. Many fire departments hold push-in ceremonies as a tribute to early firefighters and encourage community members to participate.

Following a prayer led by Deputy Chief Marcus Haynes, the community was invited to push the fire engine into the bay. Scintilla Charter Academy students, fire personnel, parents, and other citizens took part in pushing the apparatus into the station. Following the engine's placement into the bay, the children cheered, "We did it! We did it!". Afterward, children and other community members were invited to explore the new unit.

"The community's outstanding support for this event is profound," Chief Boutwell said. " I am proud to serve a community that demonstrates such a strong commitment to its first responders."
