## **VPD Creates Positive Presence Via Golf Cart Patrol**

Equipped with lights and sirens, three new street-safe golf carts unveiled recently by the Valdosta Police Department are expected to increase visibility in our neighborhoods, continue to build rapport with community members, and reduce crime.

"Crime has significantly dropped in the past four years," said Valdosta Chief of Police Brian Childress. "We expect these efforts to help to reduce those numbers even further, especially as we head into the holiday season."

Purchased almost entirely with Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) funding, the golf carts will be placed into use the Friday after the Thanksgiving holiday. Although incidents of burglary and car theft tend to be slightly higher during the holiday season, Chief Childress said he expects these new VPD assets to help reduce crime.

"These are not your typical golf carts. "You can't outrun these," he said. In addition to eliminating any barriers that patrol cars might have, the quieter and less intimidating golf carts allow officers to engage in face-to-face communications with

the public. Don't be surprised to see the officers assigned to these patrols out talking with residents in city neighborhoods as they continue to establish their positive presence.

The VPD has employed a variety of techniques over the years; these golf carts are yet another way of showing VPD's presence and concern for the Valdosta community.

Many Valdostans may be unaware of the history available at their fingertips at the SGRL. For example, did you know that library patrons have access to a broad collection of Valdosta history books—in additional to more than 200,000 books on other topics? Did you know that a local

genealogist teaches free classes monthly, and patrons have access to Heritage Quest and Ancestry (typically valued at over \$100/year) at no cost through the GALILEO system, an initiative of the University System of Georgia?

Make it a point to get to know your family and city heritage. Start by visiting the SGRL on Dec. 7, where city and library staff will be available to help you signup for the weekly city E-news, share a variety of other information about your city and community, and much more.

The holidays are filled with many distractions—from holiday cooking to spectacular decorations to family visits around the Christmas tree. In the midst of the excitement, Valdosta Fire Chief Freddie Broome wants to remind citizens to practice some simple safety tips to ensure a safe and enjoyable holiday season for all.

#### Christmas Tree Care

- Water your Christmas tree daily to keep it fresh and safe.
- Never put candles on or near a tree.
- Keep trees at least 3 feet away from any heat source or direct flame (including cigarettes).
- Don't block exits with tree or other decorations.

### Lighting

- Be sure your lights are UL, ETL, or CSA tested for safety.
- Check and replace lights with cracks, frayed wires and general damage.
- Put only as many light strings together as manufacturer's directions say is safe.
- · Do not to overload outlets.
- Never run extension cords under rugs, across areas where there is a lot of foot traffic, or near furniture.
- Unplug all lights before leaving the house or going to sleep.

#### Decorations

- Use flame-retardant or nonflammable decorations whenever possible.
- Keep decorations 3 feet away from any heat source or direct flame.
- Beware of decorations hanging on, from or above stoves and fireplaces.
- Remember to dispose of your tree promptly and properly.
- Don't leave a dry tree inside the house or garage or leaned up against the house.

### Miscellaneous tips

- Be sure all smoke detectors are properly working.
- Keep all matches and lighters out of sight and out of reach.
- Be sure candles are away from decorations, kids, pets and trees. Never leave them unattended.
- Never leave the kitchen when using the stove top. If you must leave, turn the heat off first.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers to use outside. Remind them to keep all smoking materials in their pockets.

"Fire safety is a matter of simple common sense," said Chief Broome. "Citizens who follow these general fire safety precautions can prevent potential fires, injuries or deaths this holiday season."

# Heliday Sanitatien Schedule

The City of Valdosta will be closed on Thursday, Nov. 24, in observance of the Thanksgiving holiday. However, as always, Valdosta sanitation crews will be out collecting from their regular routes.

The Sanitation Division will collect residential garbage only on Thanksgiving Day. Recyclables and yard waste for Thursday and Friday routes will both be collected on Friday, Nov. 25.

No sanitation services will be offered for the Christmas and New Year's holiday, which this year falls on Dec. 26 and Jan. 2 -- the only two holidays that sanitation workers take off for the entire year. Residential garbage, recyclables or yard waste will NOT be collected on these dates. However, citizens who normally have their sanitation collected on Mondays should place their garbage, recyclables and yard waste at the curbside by 5 a.m. on Dec. 27 and Jan. 3 for both Monday and Tuesday pickups.

Holiday trees will be recycled by chipping, a process that has a variety of benefits for our community and environment.

Chipping trees for mulch also helps our local government comply with Georgia's yard trimmings ban which prohibits the dis-

posal of yard trimmings in municipal solid waste landfills.

Residents can drop trees off at any of these three locations from Dec. 26, 2016, through

Jan. 7, 2017: The Home Depot, at 1825 Norman Drive; the Wal-Mart Super Center, at 3274 Inner Perimeter Road; and Mathis Auditorium, at 2300 N. Ashley Street.

Trees may be dropped off at any of these sites beginning on Saturday, Dec. 26; however, citizens who drop their trees off on



Saturday, Jan. 7, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at any of the above sites will receive a free tree seedling (while supplies last).
