Valdosta Receives 2017 APWA Project of the Year Award

The City of Valdosta received the 2017 Project of the Year Award from the American Public Works Association—Georgia Chapter for the construction of the Withlacoochee Water Pollution Control Plant (WPCP) and the 6.2 mile Force Main Project. The award was presented in the category of Small City/Rural Communities Disaster or Emergency Construction/Repair at the APWA-GA Annual Meeting, on July 26, in Jekyll Island, Georgia. Fire Prevention Week begins Oct. 8

In a fire, seconds count. Seconds can mean the difference between residents of our community escaping safely from a fire or having their lives end in tragedy. That's why this year's Fire Prevention Week theme: "Every Second Counts: Plan 2 Ways Out!" is so important. It reinforces why everyone needs to have an escape plan to follow:

- Draw a map of your home with all members of your household, marking two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit.
- Practice your home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out.
- Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
- Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find.
- Close doors behind you as you leave this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Once you get outside, stay outside. Never go back inside a burning building.

Smoke alarms also play an essential role in fire safety, but it takes regular testing and maintenance to guarantee they are effective. The age of a smoke alarm can be determined by looking for the date of manufacture on the back or side of the alarm. In addition to replacing smoke alarms every 10 years, citizens should remember that:

- Smoke alarms should be installed on every level of the home.
- Smoke alarms should be tested monthly.
- Batteries should be replaced according to manufacturer's recommendations or twice yearly.

The Neighborhood Development Division will host a city-wide Bulk Trash Amnesty Day, in conjunction with the nationally-recognized Make-A-Difference Day, on Saturday, Oct. 28, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. This event, funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Community Development Block Grant program, allows Valdosta residents to dispose of unwanted household items and other bulky trash items at no cost. Residents who bring their trash for disposal must bring a copy of their Valdosta Utilities statement and a photo ID as proof of residency. Valdosta residents with cars, trucks and standard-sized trailers are allowed only one trip to the Public Works Department drop-off, located at 1015 Myrtle Street. City employees and volunteers will be available to help residents unload. Call 229-671-3617 for more details.

City Announces Public Service Opportunities

Citizens who seek a rewarding public service role in the community are encouraged to apply for the 11 positions currently vacant on the city's boards, commissions, authorities or advisory committees. These volunteer positions, requiring only a few hours each month, are designed to give citizens a voice in their local government and allow them to influence decisions that shape the quality of life for residents in the community. Anyone who has been a resident of Lowndes County for at least six months prior to the nomination is eligible to apply.

The Mayor and City Council will evaluate the applicants and appoint individuals to the vacancies at the Nov. 9 City Council meeting. Interested citizens have until Nov. 1 by 5 p.m. to review the membership requirements, complete an application and sign the Code of Ethics form for any of the following positions:

- Greater Lowndes Planning Commission- 1 appointment
- Central Valdosta Development Authority/Downtown Development Authority- 3 appointments
- Valdosta Housing Authority- 1 appointment (The Mayor will make this appointment)
- Valdosta-Lowndes County Conference Center & Tourism Authority- 2 appointments (One of these slots is for a City Council appointee)
- Valdosta Housing Board of Adjustments & Appeals- 2 appointments
- Valdosta-Lowndes County Construction Board of Adjustments & Appeals- 2 appointments (Applicants must have construction experience and one of these slots must be filled by a General Contractor)


A Fireworks Reminder

Georgia House Bill 727, effective in 2015, legalized the use of fireworks in the state of Georgia. Valdosta residents should remember that there are state laws and local ordinances that provide guidance on the usage of fireworks. These laws and ordinances exist to protect residents from injury and to also respect the rights of our neighbors.

According to the state law, fireworks are allowed on New Years Eve from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m.; July 3 from 9 p.m. to 11:59 p.m.; July 4 from 9 p.m. to 11:59 p.m. On

all other days of the year, fireworks are allowed from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. However, if the fireworks used are not violating the county or municipal noise ordinance, they may be enjoyed up to midnight.

In addition to those time restrictions. the law bans people from igniting fireworks on roadways, right-of-ways, highways and within 100 yards of hospitals, nursing homes and prisons. GPP Students Gain Financial Literacy

Six of the 17 high school student employed at the City of Valdosta through the Great Promise Partnership have opened their very first checking accounts with First Commerce Credit Union. Most of the GPP students this year are high school seniors who will be graduating next May, then going off to college, the military, or just starting to work in their chosen career.

"For many of the students, these have been their first formal discussions on money and credit management, the importance of saving, and the benefits of establishing a relationship with a financial institution."

The GPP student are learning a lot about careers in local government and about the importance of having a good career that provides an income for living expenses. Courtroom Etiquette: What you Should Know

When you arrive at court, your appearance, dress, and actions can affect how the court sees you and how successful you are in presenting your case. By order of the Valdosta Municipal Court, violations of these conduct rules may result in your removal from the courtroom.

Rules of Conduct:

- Be on time. If you are late, your case may be rescheduled.
- Do not talk at the same time as the Judge, court officials, opposing counsel, or witnesses.
- Racist, sexist, obscene, or profane language and gestures are prohibited unless it is pertinent to a case, elicited, and quoted from facts in the case.
- No clothing depicting violence, sexual acts and/or content, profanity or illegal drugs.
- Do not enter and/or exit and disrupt the courtroom excessively.
- Do not disturb or distract the court, counsels, witnesses, or other court officials.
- Children must not create a disturbance or they will be kept out of the courtroom.
- Do not approach the Judge's bench without permission.
- Rise when the Judge enters and remain standing until the Judge or Bailiff announces to be seated or until the Judge is seated.
- Rise when the Judge exits the courtroom.
- No food or drinks are allowed in the courtroom.

Prohibited Items:

- Weapons of any kind, including pocket knives or blades of any kind.
- Electronic equipment such as cell phones, video, voice recorders, cameras, or laptops (unless approved by the court).
- No bags, pocketbooks, briefcases, boxes or other containers will be allowed in the courtroom (unless approved by the court).

Security Precautions:

- Before entering the court, be prepared to go through a security checkpoint.
- You will be asked to walk through a metal detector and/or an officer will use a wand to check for prohibited items.
- An officer will search any personal belongings that will be taken into the courtroom. If you refuse to cooperate, you may be denied entry to the facility.
- No hats, scarves or head-covers allowed in the courtroom unless worn for religious or medical reasons.
