
City Beat

City Receives National Recognition for Housing Program

The City of Valdosta received the Gabe Zimmerman Award for Public Service from the National Community Development Association (NCDA), on Jan. 21, at an awards ceremony in Washington D.C. Assistant to the City Manager Mara Register accepted the award on behalf of the city for its exemplary ability to secure and utilize federal and state grants that fund the city's Single Family Rehabilitation/Reconstruction Housing Program.

The Single Family Rehabilitation/Reconstruction Housing Program assists eligible low-to-moderate income families that live within the City of Valdosta's Designated Revitalization Area (DRA) in the rehabilitation or reconstruction of their homes. This program has rehabilitated or reconstructed 34 homes since 2005, and currently has 11 homes that have begun the rehabilitation/reconstruction process.

Over \$2.2 million in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds have been awarded by the Department of Housing and Urban Development

(HUD), and an additional \$513,000 in Community HOME Improvement Program (CHIP) funding has been awarded by the Department of Community Affairs, to fund the city's housing program.

The city is currently focusing on the Westside, Tom Town and Pinevale neighborhoods within the DRA. This targeted neighborhood approach is the primary reason the city received the award from NCDA. Once a homeowner is determined eligible—based on homeownership, income criteria and the extent of rehabilitation assistance required— their homes may be rehabilitated or reconstructed utilizing CDBG and CHIP funding.

This is not the first time the City of Valdosta has been recognized for the role it plays in eliminating substandard housing and improving the quality of life for its citizens. Valdosta was designated by Habitat for Humanity International in 2001 as a 21st Century Challenge Community and set the year

The City of Valdosta was honored as a Tree City U.S.A. community for its 25th consecutive year at the Feb. 18 annual Arbor Day event, held on the playground of S.L. Mason Elementary School. Valdosta was recognized as a Tree City U.S.A. community for meeting four standards including designating a Tree Commission, passing a tree care ordinance, establishing a comprehensive community forestry program, and proclaiming and hosting

an Arbor Day celebration. This award further demonstrates the city's management in the planting, maintenance, and removal of trees in Valdosta's urban forest.

2020 as the goal for eliminating all substandard housing within the city limits. The city is a three-time recipient of the Magnolia Award, and a recipient of the NCDA Terrence R. Duvernay Award and the NCDA Audrey Nelson Community Development Achievement Award. In addition to other grant awards, the city was recently the recipient of an \$800,000 award given by the Federal

Home Loan Bank (FHLB) through the Affordable Housing Program, the largest single housing grant awarded to the city in its history.

Council Wrap Up

The Valdosta City Council approved a number of ordinances and resolutions, bids and contracts, and local funding requests at recent Council meetings, such as the:

- Resolution to partner with the Georgia Department of Revenue in an effort to ensure proper payment of sales tax;
- Ordinance to establish standards for outdoor watering for the City of Valdosta;
- Bids for Laboratory Information Management System Software and various equipment for the Valdosta Regional Crime Lab;
- Bid for the Pump Station Improvements Project;
- Request to authorize the Mayor to execute a Letter of Commitment and approve a Federal Home Loan Bank Affordable Housing Program Agreement for owner-occupied housing rehabilitation in the Westside, Tom Town, and Pinevale neighborhoods;
- Resolution authorizing the filing of an application with the Department of Homeland Security/Federal Emergency Management Agency to fund the purchase of fire and arson investigation equipment and educational materials for Valdosta Fire Department's fire prevention, arson, and educational campaigns;
- Request for emergency replacement of a culvert on Country Club Drive;
- Appointments to several of the city's Boards, Commissions, Authorities and Advisory Committees; and the
- Ordinance for a 120-day moratorium on accepting applications for business licenses and other permits from Sweepstakes/Café Parlors in the City of Valdosta.

Taking the First Step in Business

The City of Valdosta strives to maintain a proactive business environment and encourages new development in our community. These new businesses provide jobs, enrich the fabric of our community, and stimulate the local economy. A new link located on the City of Valdosta's website can aid anyone from the first-time entrepreneur to the seasoned developer with primary steps to building a successful business in the city limits.

Starting a business is exciting, however, it can also be challenging. From the city's homepage, citizens are guided through the primary steps to business success, which include the First Step and Pre-Application meetings, plan submittal and review, permitting, and inspection processes, obtaining a Certificate of Occupancy, and applying for a business license.

The First Step meeting was designed to be one of the "first steps" in establishing a business. Meetings are held every Thursday morning and need to be scheduled in advance. These meetings are informal discussions in a group setting and last approximately 30 minutes. They give potential developers a chance to meet with representatives from city departments such as Engineering, Fire, Inspections, Arbor Division, Planning/Zoning, Public Works, and Utilities.

Additional links provided on the city's website provide information about the City of Valdosta Land Development Regulations, Valdosta Small Emerging Business Program, Valdosta State University Small Business Development Center, and the Valdosta - Lowndes County Chamber of Commerce, and more.

City Decreases Carbon Footprint with Recycling Program

The City of Valdosta is proud to offer a single-stream recycling program, introduced to citizens in 2007 and managed by the Public Works Department. The program is one in which all recyclable materials—such as newspaper, cardboard, plastic and glass—are mixed together in the collection truck, instead of being sorted by residents into separate commodities.

Since participation requires less work by residents, perhaps the greatest advantage of the city's single-stream recycling program is that it means more recyclables are placed at the curb and more residents participate in the recycling program. The program also reduces collection costs and allows more paper grades to be collected—including junk mail, telephone books, and other residential paper. The City of Valdosta recycles over 3,000 tons of recyclable commodities each year.

Ever wonder what happens to the recycled materials once they are picked up from the curbside? All recyclable materials are brought back to the city's recycling center on Myrtle Street and compacted into bales of comingled materials, each bale weighing up to 1,700 lbs. These materials are then sold to SP Recycling Corporation or other end processors, who pick up the material from the city's center and recycle the material for domestic and export markets. The Atlanta-based company sells over 1 million tons of newspaper and 460,000 tons of other recyclables annually—all of which are kept out of the landfills and recreated into other usable items.

In addition to the single-stream recycling program, the city coordinates with Keep Lowndes Valdosta Beautiful and Atlanta Recycling Solutions to provide two community electronic recycling events per year. Last year, citi-

zens participated in recycling over 132,000 pounds of electronics—that's over 66 tons of metal, plastic, glass, computer housing and peripheral equipment that were processed and sent on to an appropriate recycling end-market by Atlanta Recycling Solutions to be manufactured into recycled content products.

According to Deputy City Manager for Operations John Whitehead, III, "The city's single-stream recycling program is a result of responsible city leadership with strong convictions in regard to current environmental issues. We continually look for ways to decrease our carbon footprint, while maintaining quality services for our citizens."

City Hosts Electronic Recycling Event, April 2

The City of Valdosta Public Works Department, in partnership with Keep Lowndes/Valdosta Beautiful (KLVB) and Atlanta Recycling Solutions, will host an Electronic Recycling Event on Saturday, April 2, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., at Mathis Auditorium, at 2300 N. Ashley Street. This event is one of two annual e-recycling events and other year-round efforts that support the city's recycling program by providing citizens with a viable solution to properly dispose of their electronics.

Citizens may drop off a number of electronic items at the event, such as cell phones, computer monitors, laptops, disk and floppy drives, test equipment, modems, circuit boards, typewriters, cables, eight-tracks, computer accessories, video machines,

stereos, video cassette recorders (VCRs), CB radios, scanners, speakers, camcorders and cameras. Televisions will be accepted at the event, but there is a \$10 charge per television to cover the costs of dissembling the televisions for the recyclable parts.

A number of volunteers will be available at Saturday's event to help remove items from citizens' vehicles. The "drive-through" feature will further make disposing of these items very convenient to participants—providing no reason for citizens to get out of their vehicles.

A number of items will not be accepted at the April 2 event—such as vacuum cleaners, refrigerators, washers, dryers, gas-powered equipment, non-electronic equipment, and other



non-recyclable items. Citizens may call the Public Works Department at (229) 671-3640 for more information.

City Partners with V.I.T.A. for Free Tax Preparation

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) is providing free tax preparation to citizens in households earning \$49,000 a year or less. VITA staff helps individuals file a tax return and are trained in helping individuals apply for the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), a refundable federal income tax credit for low to moderate income working individuals and families, as well as other tax credits.

Several federal, state and local VITA sponsors—such as the Internal Revenue Service, the Georgia Department of Human Resources, United Way, and others—are making this service possible. The free tax assistance and preparation will be offered at four Valdosta sites.

Lawn chemicals, car oils, pet waste and litter are washed into storm drains every time it rains. These drains lead directly to our local waterways untreated, impacting aquatic life and their habitats. These events inform people of the direct path from the storm drain to the waterways.
