Mayor and Four City Councilmen Sworn in, Jan. 5

It was standing room only in the Valdosta City Hall Council Chambers on Jan. 5 as Valdosta's 45th mayor was sworn into office by Superior Court Judge Richard M. Cowart.

"I'm honored to represent the Valdosta citizens as their mayor and look forward to the opportunities ahead," said Mayor Gayle. "I encourage citizens to get involved with the local government, so that together we can make this community stronger."

Also sworn in at the meeting were City Councilman Ben Norton, who was re-elected to serve At-Large; and City Councilman James Wright, District 1; City Councilman Joseph "Sonny" Vickers, District

3; and City Councilman Tim Carroll, District 5; each retaining their seats representing their respective districts.

Councilman Alvin Payton was elected by the Mayor and Council by a unanimous vote to serve his second term as the Mayor Pro Tem, fulfilling the role of mayor in the mayor's absence. Opportunity Zone Certification

Provides Tax Credits for Local Businesses

Businesses located in any of Valdosta's designated Opportunity Zones may qualify for job tax credits that benefit the individual businesses, as well as contribute to positive growth in some of the city's underdeveloped areas.

These tax credits are offered to businesses that are certified through the Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA) Opportunity Zone Certification program—a program that targets community areas in need of redevelopment and revitalization. Valdosta businesses certified through the Opportunity Zone Certification program may be eligible for job tax credits of \$3,500 per eligible new job created and may use the tax credit against 100 percent of Georgia income tax liability and payroll withholding.

Baha Zeidan, owner of Azalea Health Innovations, Inc., said the program could save his company an estimated \$24,500 a year, for as long as the City of Valdosta maintains the Opportunity Zone designation. Azalea Health Innovations, Inc. is a provider in cloud-based electronic health records software, practice management software, and revenue cycle management services, with offices in downtown Valdosta—which is one of the city's designated Opportunity Zones. Zeidan recently received his certification from DCA, qualifying him to take the credits in the 2011 tax year if he meets all other criteria. Azalea Health Innovations, Inc. is responsible for creating seven new jobs in downtown Valdosta during 2011.

"As we wait for the economy to turn in our favor, we are grateful for the assistance available to us through the City of Valdosta and the Georgia Department of Community

Affairs," said Zeidan. "These tax credits spur us to look for more ways to create jobs in the new year, and it also rewards us for expanding our business in parts of the community where there is a specific need for growth. We are fortunate to be able to help the community, while helping our business grow at the same time."

Opportunity Zones exist for a period of 10 years from the date of designation or for the life of the city's redevelopment plan. The City of Valdosta received its Opportunity Zone designation from DCA in 2009. This business incentive is also part of the comprehensive package offered through the Main Street Program to facilitate development in the historic downtown districts. Other incentives include low-interest loans and historic preservation tax credits.

Proper Method of Tree Pruning

Winter is the best season for pruning many types of trees and other aesthetic plants in the city. The City of Valdosta wants to remind commercial property owners, landscaping businesses and lawn maintenance crews of the Land Development Regulations (LDR) that protect trees within the city limits from improper pruning methods.

LDR Section 328-26 states that "No tree topping or roundovering shall be allowed on new developments, city right-of-ways, city lands, or non-residential properties." The purpose of the requirement is to protect the aesthetic value of city trees and the cooling effect provided by their canopies.



According to the city's Urban Forest Supervisor Stacey Griffin, "tree topping" is a common term among landscapers and is the procedure of simply cutting the top of the tree off. This tree pruning method provides no benefits to the tree and actually prevents the tree from maturing to natural heights and sizes and eliminates the desired shade and aesthetics that the tree was intended for when planted. "Roundovering" is the practice of cutting back a tree for a "lollipop effect" and shares the same results as tree topping.

"There is no proper way to top a crape myrtle—as they shouldn't be topped at all; however, there are several ways to improperly top them," said Griffin. "Unfortunately, each time a crape myrtle is topped it greatly stunts the growth of the tree, causes the unsightly appearance of bare nubby trunks in the landscape, and eventually leads to the death of the tree."

Essay Contest Allows 6th Graders to Consider Being Mayor

Local 6th graders can dream about what it would be like to be the city's top elected official by participating in the "If I Were Mayor, I Would..." essay contest, sponsored by the Georgia Municipal Association (GMA) and the City of Valdosta. Efficient Travel throughout the City

With over 125 traffic signals in the city limits, it's no wonder that some motorists may ask why the traffic lights in particular locations appear to take longer to turn "green" than in other locations. The staff at the city's Traffic Management Center (TMC) manages the efficiency of the city's traffic lights for the safety and pleasant traveling experiences of our citizens and guests and offers a few reminders to motorists to make their travels throughout the city more efficient.

When stopping at a red light, motorists are reminded to stop just short of the wide white stop bar painted on the road near the intersections. Do not pull ahead of these bars, or the magnetic field in the inductive loops below the pavement will not identify the car upon it. When stopped properly before this bar, the magnetic field in the pavement below sends a signal to the traffic signal cabinet that a car is waiting for a green light.

Once the green light appears, enough time is allocated to serve the number of vehicles waiting, provided the vehicles follow promptly through the light within 4 seconds of each other. However, when drivers are distracted and allow large gaps to form between the vehicles, the signal "gaps out" and begins the yellow and red light rotation.

Often citizens will notice the light changing to yellow while traveling through the intersection. This often occurs because the intersection is working properly and is ready to give time back to the traffic waiting on the main street. The main street, by definition, has more traffic and hence more green time than the side streets. However, motorists on side streets can expect a 100- to 150-second cycle for their red light to turn green once again.

Some intersections within the city limits may have different cycles due to the size and shape of the intersections and which through movements and/or turn movements can be handled simultaneously. A few others—Ashley Street, Patterson Street and Inner Perimeter Road between VHS and N. Valdosta Road—are coordinated on signal loops to allow traffic to flow more efficiently due to the anticipated traffic volume. If motorists travel the designated speed limit, they should be able to travel the distance on green lights.

The city follows federal and state guidelines for all signal designs. Citizens may call the TMC at (229) 259-5431 for more information or to request a group tour of the facility.

Valdosta Honored as a Tree City U.S.A. Community

The Valdosta Tree Commission will host the annual Arbor Day ceremony, on Friday, Feb. 17, at 10 a.m., on the front lawn of Valdosta State University. The City of Valdosta will be honored as a Tree City U.S.A. community for its 26th consecutive year and VSU will be certi-

fied as a "Tree Campus U.S.A."

Valdosta is recognized for meeting four standards including designating a Tree Commission, passing a tree care ordinance, establishing a comprehensive community forestry program, and proclaiming and hosting an Arbor Day celebration. This award further demonstrates the city's management in the planting, maintenance, and removal of trees in Valdosta's urban forest.

Mayor John Gayle is expected to accept the Tree City U.S.A. designation from the Georgia Department of Forestry and the Arbor Day Foundation.

The Tree City U.S.A. program was established by the Arbor Day Foundation, along with the National Association of State Foresters and the USDA Forest Service, to improve community forestry. There are more than 3,400 Tree City U.S.A. communities across the nation, representing 135 million citizens.
