#### Walking in the City

Longer afternoons of daylight translates into hours of outdoor recreation and fun. Citizens are reminded to visit **www.vlpra.com** for information on a variety of outdoor recreation options to increase your health and fitness levels within the city limits.

Walking, for example, is a moderate form of exercise that is enjoyable and relatively inexpensive to pursue, and can take place at the following:

 Enjoy the outside walking tracks at the Wood Valley Community Center, Scott Park, Freedom Park or Payton Park.

 The Valdosta Middle School track is available after school operating hours and on the weekends. NOTE: VMS has announced that it will install a fence around the track from March 17 through April 30 to ensure student safety. During school hours of operations (weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.), citizens may instead utilize the sidewalk system around McKey Park (across from VMS) for another safe walking option.

 In addition to walking and jogging, the 3.1-mile Azalea City Trail—which extends from Vallotton Park to the Craig Center allows citizens to enjoy bike riding, skating and other forms of recreation.

## **Tree City USA** for 28th Consecutive Year

The City of Valdosta was honored by the Georgia Forestry Commission as a Tree City USA community for the 28th consecutive year, at a ceremony on Feb. 21. Of Georgia's 536 cities, only 138 are Tree Cities and only nine cities—including Valdosta—have received this designation for 28 consecutive years.

In order to be designated as a Tree City USA community, Valdosta met four standards established by the

The Tree City USA and Tree Campus USA programs were established by the Arbor Day Foundation, along with the National Association of State Foresters and the USDA Forest Service, to improve community forestry.

#### Trees play an important role in Stormwater.

Trees are a vital part of an urban environment. By planting trees in neighborhoods, parking lots and streetscapes, it not

only enhances our municipal infrastructure, but it also assists with stormwater management.

Stormwater runoff can be reduced, for example, when rain is captured by tree leaves and bark or absorbed into the ground, which then enters the root system. Additional benefits of trees when incorporated into stormwater can include creating new habitat, reduction in pollutants from entering our local waterways, and site stabilization.

# **Mayor and City Council Set Goals for FY 2015**

The Valdosta Mayor and City Council held their annual retreat in January to develop the following goals for Fiscal Year 2015. The information below is also available at **www.valdostacity.com**, along with more information about the Mayor and Council's work in the city.



- 1. Bid, award contract and begin construction of the Force Main Project.
- 2. Bid, award contract and begin construction of the Withlacoochee Wastewater Treatment Plant.
- 3. Implement the SPLOST VII projects as approved.
- 4. Develop a Request for Proposal and secure software/hardware for technology upgrades for the Municipal Court and the Valdosta Police Department to assist in more efficiency in operation.
- 5. Work with the Industrial Authority and other appropriate entities to address the need for improvement and enhance ment of broadband throughout the county.
- 6. Develop a plan for improvement to the gateways and entrances into the city and begin implementation.
- 7. Broaden City Government 101 to include up to five slots for high school seniors from the local schools who have a parent in the program.
- 8. Identify additional revenue sources and/or expense reductions in order for the City to continue to operate in a fiscally responsible manner.
- 9. Collaborate with community and regional leaders to continue advocacy efforts on behalf of Moody Air Force Base in support of its value to national defense and our community and seek opportunities for base growth and expansion in preparation for future Base Realignment and Closure Commissions.
- 10. Work with the Valdosta-Lowndes County Industrial Authority and the Regional Economic Development Authority to host a regional economic development summit to bring recognition, awareness and opportunities to our city and region.
- 11. Continue collaboration with the US Army Corps of Engineers and work with state and federal officials to seek funding and identify solutions to address regional flooding issues.
- 12. Adopt a new Code of Ordinances.

#### Deadline Extended for 5th Annual Government 101

Applications are now being accepted for the 5th annual Government 101 Citizens Orientation Program. Participants will meet for six consecutive Mondays, from 5:30 – 8:30 p.m., beginning April 7. Government 101 is designed to give Valdosta and other local citizens age 21 and older a deeper understanding and appreciation of their local government. The program, an initiative of the Mayor and City Council, has recently been modified to include up to five high school seniors who have a parent or legal guardian also enrolled in the program.

Participants will be exposed to all city departments--such as Fire, Police, Municipal Court, Engineering and Finance--and will get an inside look at how the city operates daily. A maximum of 25 people will be selected for the class from citizens who submit a completed application by the March 21, 2014 deadline and pass the required background checks. If more than 25 people apply, the city will give preference to applicants on a first-come, first-served-basis.

## **Call for Valdosta Historic Preservation Nominations**

The City of Valdosta is accepting nominations for the 6th annual Valdosta Preservation Awards, which recognizes significant historic preservation projects that contribute to the preservation and enhancement of historic buildings in the local Valdosta Historic District.

Nominations for Preservation Awards may be submitted in five categories:



**Outstanding Achievement Award Distinguished Merit Award Stewardship Award Excellence in Compatible New Construction Award** Harold M. Bennett Lifetime Achievement Award

Buildings nominated for the Outstanding Achievement Award and Distinguished Merit Award categories must be at least 50 years old and located in the Valdosta Historic District. Nominations will be considered for projects completed within the last three years and will be reviewed by the Valdosta Preservation Awards Committee, comprised of members of the Valdosta Historic Preservation Commission, the Lowndes County Historical Society and the Valdosta Heritage Foundation. Award decisions will be based on the contributions of the projects to the architectural and historical character of the Valdosta Historic District.

The Valdosta Preservation Awards will be presented at the May 22, 2014 Valdosta City Council meeting, during National Historic Preservation Month. Award nominees and winners will be notified the first week of May 2014.

**Helping People** Get Back on Their Feet

A statewide unemployment mortgage HomeSafeGeorgia payment assistance program is made possible through a Georgia Department of Community Affairs partnership, which is helping to prevent foreclosures, under the name HomeSafe Georgia. This pro-

gram helps citizens by providing "bridge" mortgage assistance to many Georgians who are unemployed or have seen a dramatic decrease in their income due to national economic conditions.

The Mortgage Payment Assistance program provides temporary mortgage assistance for eligible applicants who have a qualifying unemployment or underemployment hardship that began in the last 36 months. The applicant's monthly mortgage payments are paid to the lender for up to 24 months for first and some second mortgages until the recipients can get back on their feet.
