


New Valdosta City Council Districts Map Approved by USDOJ

The City of Valdosta received approval from the U.S. Department of Justice, Civil Rights Division, for the 2011 redistricting plan for its city council districts.

Council approved the amendment to the City of Valdosta Charter at the May 19 Council Meeting to re-define City Council districts as required for re-apportionment based upon the 2010 U.S. Census. The recent Census revealed that the City of Valdosta grew by approximately 11,000 residents over the past decade, causing an uneven distribution of population among the city's six voting districts. The new population of 54,518 set an ideal district size of 9,086 per district. The amendments, as reflected in the new Valdosta City Council Districts map, reduced the population gap between the districts so that all districts are now within five percent of the ideal district size.

The new Valdosta City Council Districts map is effective for the 2011 municipal elections, as required by law. Council Approves No Increase in Millage Rate

The Valdosta City Council approved the 2012 millage rate at their Aug. 11 council meeting. The city will again maintain the present millage rate of 4.11 for 2012 and will maintain the same level of services with a reduced

budget. Although the state mandated form used to determine the millage rate calculated an increase, the city declined to accept the state-authorized increase in order to assist Valdosta property owners during these

challenging times.

Property taxes paid to the city will decrease with the recently approved millage rate. In fact, the levy will generate approximately \$200,000 less in

Hurricane season runs June 1-Nov. 30 each year. So far, our area has continued to dodge the big storms. - ☐ Whistle—to signal for help
- ☐ Face mask—to help filter contaminated air
- ☐ Duct tape
- ☐ Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties—for personal sanitation
- ☐ Wrench or pliers—to turn off utilities
- ☐ Local maps
- ☐ Household chlorine bleach and medicine dropper
- ☐ Fire extinguisher
- ☐ Matches in a waterproof container
- ☐ Feminine supplies and personal hygiene items
- ☐ Mess kits, paper cups, plates, plastic utensils, paper towels
- Personalize your basic kits with other items you and your family need, such as prescription medications, glasses, infant items, pet supplies, important family documents, cash, extra clothing, etc.



Stormwater Tip: Prevent Stormwater Pollution

Did you know that many of your daily activities have the potential to cause stormwater pollution? Here are some tips on how to prevent stormwater pollution:

- Divert roof drains and other runoff to vegetated areas on your property such as a rain gardens or use rain barrels.
- Keep your vehicles tuned up and repair fuel or fluid leaks quickly.
- Wash your car on the lawn instead of the driveway.
- Stop soil erosion by planting vegetation on bare areas.
- Never pour used oil, paint thinners, and other pollutants into storm drains, waterways or on the ground.
- Properly use and store all household chemicals. Clean up spills quickly by absorbing and disposing of the items properly.
- Minimize the use of fertilizers and pesticides on your lawn.
- Sweep and bag fertilizer or grass clippings on driveways and walkways instead of hosing the areas clean.
- Clean litter from the street and storm drains in front of your home and along stream banks to keep it out of our waters.
- Pick up your pet's waste.

On Saturday, Oct. 22, KLVB and the city's Community Development Department will host Make a Difference Day, from 8:30 a.m. to noon. What is Litter? Litter consists of items—such as cigarette butts, food remnants, packaging, vehicle debris and beverage containers, to name a few--found in socially unacceptable locations on our streets, parks, neighborhoods, and work sites.

Keep Lowndes Valdosta Beautiful recently completed the annual litter index of our community, to measure litter from year to year, address the problems and measure our progress. Although the reported littering rate was small (Valdosta-Lowndes County received a 2 rating on a scale of 1-4; 1—no litter, 4—extremely littered), it continues to be a significant and important social and environmental issue.

Farm Days Exceeds All Expectations

In its first year, the Downtown Valdosta Farm Days has exceeded all expectations. Up to 29 vendors at each market have wrapped around the historic Lowndes County Courthouse every other Saturday since May selling a variety of items such as fresh produce, baked goods and handmade soaps.

Spearheaded by Mayor and Council and supported by the Valdosta Main Street Program/Central Valdosta Development Authority (CVDA) and the City of Valdosta, Farm Days began as an initiative to fight childhood obesity and instill healthy eating practices within the community. The market also serves to educate the citizens about eating local, and making smart nutrition and food choices, and has become a community event that citizens look forward to every other weekend with hundreds of people showing up each market day to buy fresh, local produce, and other items.

Farms Days is held every other Saturday, in the months of May through September. The remaining Farm Days for 2011 are: Aug. 20, Sept. 3 and Sept. 17.

2011 Southern Hospitality Group Workcamp

Repairs 34 Homes in City in One Week



The City of Valdosta hosted nearly 400 campers and staff members for the 2011 Southern Hospitality Group Workcamp—one of 42 similar camps that took place all around the country. The camp was held from June 26-July 2, and campers worked by day and slept at Valdosta Middle School by night. As a result of their labor of love, 34 houses were repaired—placing the city closer to accomplishing the goal of eliminating all substandard housing by the year 2020.

In the six years that the city has hosted the Workcamp, 240 homes have been repaired—yielding a \$1.4 million economic investment in our community through capital improvements to housing stock, the value of volunteer housing, the spending in our community, and the value of their labor.

Mara Register, Assistant to the City Manager, said "It is truly a great team at the City of Valdosta and this effort is a shining testament to that spirit of cooperation. We were fortunate to have ded-

icated city staff, Lowe's Distribution Center staff, Habitat for Humanity staff, and local general contractors willing to give of their time and talents in providing expertise to the campers so they could successfully complete their projects." Workcamp partners that made the event a success were the Group Workcamp Foundation, Inc., Lowe's Distribution Center, Lowe's Retail Store, Wild Adventures Theme Park, Valdosta City Schools, Georgia Power Company, and the Valdosta Area Ministerial Alliance.

Remembrance Ceremony

A Community-Wide 9-11 Event

A community-wide Tenth Anniversary of 9-11 Remembrance Ceremony will be held on Sunday, Sept. 11, 2011, at 8:30 a.m., in front of the historic Lowndes County Courthouse, located at 108 E. Central Avenue in Downtown Valdosta. The event is sponsored by the City of Valdosta, Lowndes County and Moody Air Force Base.

The agenda features a special welcome from Moody Air Force Base leadership, as well as special performances from area choirs and participation from several community organizations to pay tribute to more than 3,000 people who lost their lives, including more than 340 public safety personnel who were killed during the rescue attempts of 9-11.

Col. Neil Robinson is the keynote speaker for the event. Col. Robinson is the 23rd Maintenance Group (MXG) Commander at Moody Air Force Base and was at the Pentagon in Washington D.C. at the time of the historic attack. Proclamations will also be read by Mayor John J. Fretti and Lowndes County Chairman Ashley Paulk declaring 9-11 a day that the citizens of Valdosta-Lowndes County will never forget. The event will conclude with a flyover, approved by the U.S. Air Force.
