

Grant Funding Available for Home Repairs

The City of Valdosta Neighborhood Development Division will be accepting applications, through August 15, for owner-occupied home rehabilitation grants from the Federal Home Loan Bank of Atlanta. Valdosta homeowners who qualify as low to moderately-low income residents (according to HUD FY 2013 Income Limits) may be eligible to use this grant funding to make much-needed home repairs.

Grants are limited to home repairs that cost under \$10,000.

Each applicant must meet the following criteria:

- Home must be located in the city's Designated Revitalization Area (DRA).
- Applicant must be the legal owner of record of the home.
- Applicant must provide proof of income and residency.
- Property taxes and insurance must be current.
- Repairs must improve and/or remedy unsafe living conditions (e.g. roof repairs, electrical & plumbing updates, repairs to floors/structural members, etc.).

Rehabilitation grants will be awarded to homeowners who can fulfill the 5-year affordability period necessary for residency in the home. Homeowners who are awarded a grant and do not fulfill the affordability period will be required to repay a portion of the entire grant.

Valdosta Water Treatment Plant Named 2013 Water Treatment Plant of the Year

The City of Valdosta Water Treatment Plant has been recognized as the 2013 Water Treatment Plant of the Year by the Georgia Association of Water Professionals (GAWP), scoring a 90% or better in all areas including well-field operations, chemical processes and documentation.

"Every day, thousands of water customers in our city turn on their faucets with little thought to the water that streams out and how it moves from its initial source through the treatment process and ultimately to our taps," said Director of Utilities Henry Hicks. "I commend Water Treatment Plant Superintendent Craig Dozier, Assistant Superintendent Jason Barnes, and the other skilled men and women responsible for bringing Valdosta water customers quality drinking water daily."

The city's water treatment plant, located

on Guest Road, processes over 3.5 billion gallons of drinking water for its residential, business and industrial customers annually.

Mayor & Council Approve Balanced Budget

No property tax increase proposed for citizens

The Valdosta City Council approved the fiscal year 2014 budget for the City of Valdosta at the June 20 City Council meeting, after having the opportunity to hear the proposed budget at the hearings on June 11 and 12. City staff presented the



council with a balanced budget, as required by the City Charter, possibly one of the most challenging and difficult budgets prepared in years.

City leaders decreased the overall city budget from \$86.2 million to \$77.3 million, a result of the completion of Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (SPLOST VI) capital improvement projects and the fact that this funding source will end in December 2013. The 2014 fiscal budget represents a city operating in a fiscally responsible manner with no general obligation debt, something City Manager Larry Hanson credits to the outstanding work of the city department heads, finance director, budget staff and the entire city workforce.

The budget is balanced and includes no proposed tax increases. The City of Valdosta's millage rate of 4.106 continues to be among the lowest in state. In fact, Valdosta—Georgia's 14th largest city—has the lowest cumulative taxes of the 15 largest cities in Georgia. The last millage rate increase was in 1992 when the city's millage was raised to 6.25 mills.

JOB TAX CREDITS

For Eligible Businesses Located in City's Expanded Opportunity Zone

The Valdosta City Council recently approved to expand the southern boundaries of the city's Urban Redevelopment Area in order to extend Enterprise Zone and Opportunity Zone incentives to those areas. Approved by the Mayor and City Council, the expansion results in job tax credits to qualifying businesses who locate and create jobs in these designated underdeveloped "zones" of the city.

Businesses may qualify for these tax credits if they are certified through the Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA) Opportunity Zone Certification Program—a program that targets community areas in need of redevelopment and revitalization. Through this process, certified businesses in Valdosta may be eligible for job tax credits of \$3,500 per eligible new job created, if the business meets the minimum job creation threshold. Furthermore, qualifying businesses may also use these tax credits against 100 percent of the Georgia income tax liability and payroll withholding for as long as the City of Valdosta maintains the Opportunity Zone designation.

The City of Valdosta received its Opportunity Zone designation from DCA in 2009 to encourage businesses to look for ways to create jobs and expand their businesses in parts of the community where there is a specific need for growth. Opportunity Zones exist for a period of 10 years from the date of designation, or for the life of the city's redevelopment plan. This business incentive is also a part of the comprehensive package offered through the Main Street Program to facilitate development in the historic downtown districts. Other incentives offered through the Main Street Program include low-interest loans and historic preservation tax credits.

City Enters Agreement with USACE for Flood Risk Management Study

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) finalized its \$150,000 agreement with the City of Valdosta, on July 15, to participate in the Planning Assistance to States program. This 50/50 cost share project will enable the USACE to conduct a flood risk management study for the confluence of the Sugar Creek and With-lacoochee River.

The flood risk management study is scheduled to be completed by November 2013 and is the first step towards identifying the causes so that short and long term plans can be developed to resolve the flooding problems in our area.

The partnership stems from a continuation of discussions that began earlier in the year focused on regional interests and on maximizing area resources. The City of Valdosta hosted a Regional Flood Preparedness meeting with the Georgia Silver Jackets on June 25 in which representatives from the cities of Moultrie, Sylvester, Tifton and Valdosta and from the counties of Lowndes and Turner attended to discuss current and future flood monitoring and forecasting issues throughout the Little River and Withlacoochee River watersheds. These two watersheds are part of the overall Suwannee Basin that is approximately 10,000 square miles that drain into the Valdosta area and parts of northern Florida.

Among other information

shared at the June meeting, the U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) and the National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) /National Weather Service presented information on storm preparedness resources, rain and stream gage networks, flood categories, and monitoring programs such as Water Alerts and Water Now.

As a result of the collaboration of agencies and resources, representatives from the Georgia and Florida Silver Jackets, City of Valdosta and the Suwannee River Water Management District met in Live Oak, Fla., on July 10 to begin outlining

problems and opportunities for the Suwannee Basin. On July 17, members of the USACE visited Valdosta to tour the areas in the city prone to flood events.

City leadership is committed to working with representatives from key local, state and federal agencies to address and provide solutions for the regional stormwater issue that creates flooding in our city and surrounding communities in both Georgia and Florida.

Conserve Water with Outdoor Water Use Schedule

The city's Outdoor Water Use Schedule allows outdoor watering for purposes of planting, growing, managing, or maintaining ground cover, trees, shrubs or other plants, before 10 a.m. and after 4 p.m. on odd/even days, dictated by the citizen's home address (No outdoor watering should occur during the hours of 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.):

> ODD NUMBERED ADDRESSES May water on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday

EVEN NUMBERED and UNNUMBERED ADDRESSES--May water on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday

*** No outdoor watering for the above stated purposes will be allowed on Sundays

Enjoy Summer...But, Don't Forget the Bug Spray

In South Georgia, summer and mosquitoes go hand in hand. While the City of Valdosta is taking the necessary precautions to make sure the mosquito population is under control by spraying in public areas and on public streets, citizens play an important role by doing the following:

• Disposing of any containers around property that collect water— flower pots, bird baths, buckets, tires, etc. Standing water serves as a breeding ground for mosquitoes, and even a small container of standing water can produce hundreds of new mosquitoes each day.

 Eliminate any tall weeds or grasses around property, as these serve as "resting" places for mosquitoes.

 Organize or participate in clean-up activities to pick up garbage from parks and other public spaces. This helps reduce the number of potential breeding grounds for mosquitoes.

 Stock any ornamental ponds with mosquito-eating fish.

• Clean and chlorinate pools, outdoor spas and saunas; keep them covered when not in use.

Clean out clogged gutters.

By following these simple recommendations, citizens will help reduce exposure to these annoying and disease-carrying insects.

Citizens should also use larvicide tablets in areas where standing water cannot be removed—ornamental ponds, creeks, etc. Larvicide does not harm pond fish. Larvicide is more effective than spraying because it kills the larvae before they have a chance to hatch. Free larvicide tablets are available to city residents at the City of Valdosta Public Works Department, located at 1017 Myrtle Street, weekdays from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

If you must be outdoors at dawn or dusk when mosquitoes are most active, you should protect yourself by spraying insect repellent containing DEET on your body and clothing to help protect yourself against contact with mosquitoes. As an alternative to DEET, the

CDC also recommends repellents that contain oil of eucalyptus or the chemical Picaridin. Be sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions carefully, and do not use on children or pregnant women. Also, keep in mind that if you are using sunscreen, apply the sunscreen first and then the repellant.

The city's Public Works staff will continue to monitor mosquito activity throughout the city limits and will continue to maintain its aggressive spraying and larvicide efforts to control the mosquito population. Protect Yourself with DEET

DEET (chemical name, N,N-diethylmeta-toluamide) is the active ingredient in many insect repellent products. In addition to its ability to repel mosquitoes, did you know that DEET can repel other potentially disease-carrying insects, such as ticks?

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) receives more than 20,000 reports of Lyme disease (transmitted by deer ticks) and 100 reports of encephalitis (transmitted by mosquitoes) annually. Both of these diseases can cause serious health problems or even death in the case of encephalitis.

The CDC recommends use of insect repellents when outdoors. Here are a few other recommendations:

 Read and follow all directions and precautions on the product label.

• Do not apply over cuts, wounds, or irritated skin.

• Do not apply to hands or near eyes and mouth of young children.

 Do not allow young children to apply this product.

 Use just enough repellent to cover exposed skin and/or clothing.

The City of Valdosta hosted 212 volunteers from across the country for the 2013 Southern Hospitality Workcamp, from June 23-29, during which time 18 houses were repaired in our community at no cost to the homeowners.



These "campers"--mostly youth--paid \$400 each to attend the Workcamp, in addition to the travel expenses of getting to Valdosta. Valdosta was proud to host campers from nine different states, as far away as Texas, Wisconsin and New York which speaks volumes about the commitment of these volunteers.

Their collective labor of love, even at minimum wage, is valued at over \$61,480. In addition, these campers collected nearly 800 cans of food for our local Second Harvest Food Bank, another selfless act of kindness they shared with our community. The city has hosted eight Southern Hospitality Workcamps; and as a result, a total of 275 homes have been repaired in Valdosta. To date, the annual event has yielded more than a \$1.5 million economic investment in our community through capital improvements to housing stock, the value of volunteer housing, their spending in our community and the value of their labor. This figure also represents the investments of the city, Lowe's Distribution Center and Group Cares in this effort.

camp is a shining example of a program that identifies needs, helps stop the deterioration of valuable housing availability,

ROAD IMPROVEMENTS in the City

Two significant road projects are underway that, when complete, are expected to improve travel across the city:

Gornto Road Extension Project

Motorists have most likely noticed the progress made on the Gornto Road Ext. project—which is connecting Woodrow Wilson Drive to Gornto Road to provide another east-west connector route through the city. The realignment construction to tie the new Gornto Road Extension to Woodrow Wilson Drive has begun, and approximately 500 feet of Woodrow Wilson Drive from the N. Patterson Street intersection is permanently closed to align the new road. Mo-

torists have access to the businesses in that area until the new road is complete. The new intersection at Gornto Road Ext. and Woodrow Wilson Drive has been installed with the city's first video detection system—a device that will identify when vehicles are present and will trigger the new signal light appropriately. The Gornto Road Ext. project is on schedule and is expected to be complete by December 2013.

E. Hill Avenue Overpass Construction

Construction has begun on the new U.S.84/S.R. 38/West Hill Avenue railroad overpass. In collaboration with the City of Valdosta, the Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) has designated vehicle and truck detour routes that will remain in effect until the project is complete. This DOT project is expected to be completed by December 2014.

The City of Valdosta apologizes for any inconvenience and asks for cooperation from motorists in observing all detour routes for the safety of our citizens and the workers on site. City of Valdosta Recertified as an Azalea City

The City of Valdosta was recertified in April 2013 as an Azalea City by the Azalea Society of America, a non-profit educational and scientific society dedicated to sharing and improving the knowledge of azaleas. Azalea Society of America Chairman Robert E. "Buddy" Lee presented the award to the city's Grants Administrator Kathy Brunot, who later presented it to Mayor John Gayle at the May 9 City Council meeting.

The City of Valdosta became a certified Azalea City on March 10, 2007, for its role in promoting the appreciation of azaleas in public and private landscapes within the city limits. Citizens and businesses alike were using the fond designation many years before the official designation was received. In fact, according Lowndes County Museum Director Donald Davis, use of the name dates back as far as the year 1947. The official City of Valdosta seal, adopted in the mid 70's, also features the Azalea City designation.

The Azalea City program was established in 2004 to find, recognize, and certify those municipalities that promote and display azaleas in their "Azalea Cities." Cities seeking the official designation must meet certain requirements, apply for the certification, and must renew the certification every five years.
