Sixteen local students were sworn in at the Oct. 22 City Council meeting to serve on the inaugural Valdosta Youth Council (VYC). The VYC, initiated by Mayor John Gayle and approved by the Valdosta City Council at its Sept. 24 meeting, seeks to inspire and prepare local middle school students for leadership and civic opportunities, while allowing them to gain a better understanding of municipal government and community service.

Selection was based on academics, involvement in school and community organizations, leadership potential, and a written recommendation from a school administrator. The City of Valdosta congratulates all the VYC members.


Free Shuttle Program Rolls Into Town

A pilot bus shuttle aimed at reducing transportation barriers in the community began on Oct. 15, 2015, and will run through June 30, 2016. The program, offered through a partnership of the Georgia Department of Human Services (DHS) and the Southern Georgia Regional Commission (SGRC), utilizes DHS 5317 "New Freedom" funds designated for tools that overcome barriers that prevent citizen integration into the work force and society.

Shuttle services are offered Monday through Friday. The shuttle begins at 8 a.m. near the Mildred Hunter Community Center and will follow the same loop every hour until 5 p.m., ending back at the community center. To utilize the free shuttle, citizens must complete a mandatory registration form to receive a Client ID Card, which they must present each time they ride on the shuttle.

The route identified on the map to the left was selected to meet local needs identified in an Environmental Justice Study conducted by students at VSU. The study examined vehicular access, English proficiency, age distribution, income and poverty, race, and educational attainment as defined and measured by the U.S. Census.

DHS and the SGRC will collect data (i.e. total number of clients registered, daily ridership statistics, etc.) from the Shuttle program that may be used in identifying the continued need for a shuttle or other type of urban transportation system in Valdosta. Local Youth Can Now Explore Firefighting Career

The Valdosta Fire Department is accepting applications for its new Fire & Emergency Services Career Exploring program, which teaches and provides firsthand experience for young people ages 14 to 20 about careers in the field of fire and emergency services. To introduce this program to the community, the VFD will host an Exploring session on Monday, Nov. 9, at 6 p.m., at the VFD Station #1, located at 106 S. Oak Street.

VFD Exploring will meet on the first Tuesday of each month, from 6-9 p.m., throughout

the year and will combine classroom training with hands-on lessons to give members a well-rounded experience of the responsibilities that firefighters face. Although Exploring is a division of Boy Scouts of America, the program is open to both young men and women.

Firefighters and other emergency personnel will teach first aid, fire safety, emergency management, physical fitness, leadership methods, etc., and members may participate in local and national competitions, community events, and real firefighting scenarios in a training setting.

Applications will be available and accepted at the Nov. 9 VFD event. VFD personnel will be on hand to discuss the \$28 membership fee and other program specifics.

fall f-Recycling fvent is Here!

Citizens who may be wondering what to do with old computers or televisions stored in their garages will be pleased to know that the City of Valdosta Public Works Department, in partnership with Keep Lowndes-Valdosta Beautiful and Atlanta Recycling Solutions, is hosting its Fall Electronic Recycling Event on Saturday, Nov. 14, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., in the parking lot of Mathis City Auditorium, located at 2300 North Ashley Street.

These electronic recycling events, held every spring and fall, rain or shine, allow Valdosta citizens to discard used or unwanted electronics in a convenient and environmentally responsible manner.

Electronics that will be accepted free of charge are: Desktops, Laptops, Servers, Mainframes, Network Hubs, Network Switches, Cell Phones, Desktop Phones and Systems, Keyboards/Mice, Check Processing, Gaming Consoles, LCD Monitors, CD-ROMs, Floppy Drives, Circuit Boards, Power Supplies, Hard Drives, UPS and UPS Batteries, Ni-MH/Ni-CAD Batter-

ies, Lithium Batteries, Blu-Ray Players, Cable/ Wire, Gaming Controllers, Toner/Inkjet Cartridges, Printers, Fax Machines, Copiers, Scanners, Typewriters, Modems, Stereos, VCRs, Radios, DVD Players, CD Players and Dock Stations.

Televisions will be accepted for a \$20 charge, and CRT PC Monitors will be accepted for a \$5 charge.

The items that will not be accepted at the event are: CRT/Television Tubes, Projection/Console TVs, Washers/Dryers, Vacuum Cleaners, Wooden Speakers, Gas Grill Tanks, Battery Powered Tools, Liquid Containing Devices, Alkaline Batteries, Car Batteries, Toaster Ovens, De-Humidifiers, Gas Powered Tools, Household Trash, Microwave Ovens, Radioactive Material, Humidifiers, Tires, Freezers, Blenders, Mixers, Ovens, Hair Dryers, Ceiling Fans and Refrigerators.

Volunteers will be available at the event to help remove items from citizens' vehicles.

The City of Valdosta will be closed on Thursday, Nov. 26, in observance of the Thanksgiving holiday. The Sanitation Division will collect residential garbage only on Thanksgiving Day. Recyclables and yard waste for Thursday and Friday routes will both be collected on Friday, Nov. 27.

Residential garbage, recyclables or yard waste will NOT be collected on Dec. 25 or Jan. 1 for the Christmas and New Year's holidays. Citizens who normally have their sanitation collected on Fridays should place their garbage, recyclables and yard waste at the curbside by 5 a.m. on Dec. 26 and Jan. 2 for both Friday and Saturday pickups.
