Progress at Five Points

Citizens gathered at a Lunch and Learn on Oct. 25 to hear the progress of development at the Five Points Shopping Center property acquired by the city, where plans for a new city auditorium are being coordinated by the Five Points and Municipal Auditorium Steering Committee. The committee, reflecting a cross-community representation and tasked with guiding the 22.15-acre development. has made substantial progress since it began meeting earlier this year, as explained by Assistant to the City Manager Mara Register at the Oct. 25 event.

"This is truly a legacy project for the design team and the steering committee," said Register. "Most importantly, we want to design and develop a facility that is both accessible and affordable and that will serve this community and the region for the next 50 years."

Purchased with Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (SPLOST) dollars in 2010, the Five Points property was determined by the Strategic Planning Group, Inc. as the ideal site for the new development according to several factors such as population density, transportation, multiple use and community growth patterns.

Formed in 2011, the steering committee divided itself into two subcommittees—the Request For Qualifications (RFQ) Selection Subcommittee and the Funding and

Extreme Makeover for Browns Canal

Browns Canal--once an eyesore, as well as a growing erosion problem that threatened neighborhood properties—is receiving an extreme makeover as part of a Natural Resources Conservation Service cost-share program. This is a reimbursable program where the city is eligible to receive up to 75% of the cost, with a 25% match from in-kind or local funding. The project is located in the portion of Browns Canal in the block bordered by Lamar, West Adair, West, and Oliver

Streets. The canal itself actually starts near Ashley Street, flows just west of Hightower Street, where it then joins into Sugar Creek. Sugar Creek flows northwest along the City of Remerton, Park Lane, and a portion of Meadowbrook Drive and then joins into the Withlacoochee River.

The upgrade includes the removal of excess sediment and falling trees that has blocked the proper flow of water through the canal and the stabilization of the bank with rock-filled wire walls called gabions. Upon completion in early to mid December, the final product will be an approximately 35-foot wide channel that will reduce sediment from flowing into Sugar Creek and the Withlacoochee River, stabilize the banks to protect lives and property, provide more storage for water during a storm, and provide a more efficient flow of stormwater through the city's existing waterways.

Stormwater Tip: Don't let holiday food stick to your ribs...or your pipes

Consider your environment as you prepare for all your holiday meals. Many of the foods today have some form of fat, oil, or grease (FOG) in them that can impact both the sanitary sewer and stormwater systems if not disposed of correctly. Here are a few tips on how to safely dispose of FOGs:

- · Never pour fat, oil or grease down the drain
- Allow the oil to cool completely
- Decide whether the oil needs to be discarded or recycled. Oil used for deep-frying can usually be reused several times.
- To properly discard oil, carefully place it into a strong sealable con tainer, and then place it in the trash. Save sealable plastic jars or old coffee cans for disposing the old grease in the future.

Citizens looking for ways to save money on their utilities bill may participate in Winter Averaging. The city determines the normal sewer use for its residential customers during the months of January, February and March. Winter Averaging is the normal average sewer use for the first three months of the year. That number sets the cut-off point for billing wastewater charges for the remainder of the year.

To make the most of Winter Averaging, citizens should cut off all automatic irrigation systems and pool filling systems, and be careful to use only the amount necessary for outside water use.

By doing this, water customers only have to pay sewer charges for the amount of water from uses that are connected to the sewer, and thus will have lower monthly bills throughout the remainder of the year. For more information, contact the Utilities Department at (229) 259-3592.

The days before the Christmas and New Year's holidays are filled with many distractions—from holiday cooking to spectacular decorations to family visits around the Christmas tree. In the midst of the excitement, Valdosta Fire Chief J.D. Rice wants to remind citizens to practice some simple safety tips to ensure a safe and enjoyable holiday season for all.

Christmas Tree Care

- Water your Christmas tree daily to keep it fresh and safe.
- Never put candles on or near a tree, and keep trees at least 3 feet away from any heat source or direct flames.
 - Do not block exits with a tree or other decorations.

Lighting

- Be sure your lights are UL, ETL, or CSA tested for safety.
- Check and replace lights found to have cracks, frayed wires and general damage.
- Put only as many light strings together as manufacturer's directions say is safe.
- Do not to overload outlets.
- Never run extension cords under rugs, across areas where there is a lot of foot traffic, or near furniture.
 - Unplug all lights before leaving the house or going to sleep.


Decorations

- Use flame-retardant or nonflammable decorations whenever possible.
- Keep decorations 3 feet away from any heat source or direct flame.
- Do not hang decorations on, from or above stoves and fireplaces.
- Remember to dispose of your tree promptly and properly.
- Do not leave a dry tree inside the house, in the garage or leaned up against the house.

Miscellaneous Tips

- Be sure all smoke detectors are properly working.
- Keep all matches and lighters out of sight and out of reach.
- Be sure candles are away from decorations, kids, pets and trees. Never leave them unattended.
- Never leave the kitchen when using the stove top. If you must leave, turn the heat off first.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers to use outside. Keep all smoking materials in your pockets.

"Fire safety is a matter of common sense," said Chief Rice. "Citizens who follow these general fire safety precautions can prevent potential fires, injuries or deaths this holiday season." For more information, please call the Valdosta Fire Department at (229) 333-1835.

The Sanitation Division will collect residential garbage ONLY on Thanksgiving Day, Thursday, Nov. 24. Citizens should place their green rollouts at the curbside by 6 a.m. on this day to ensure their garbage is collected. Recyclables and yard waste for Thursday and Friday routes will be collected on Friday, Nov. 25.

The Sanitation Division will NOT collect residential garbage, recyclables or yard waste on Monday, Dec. 26 or Monday, Jan. 2. Citizens who normally have their sanitation collected on Mondays should place their garbage, recyclables and yard waste at the curbside by 6 a.m. on Tuesday, Dec. 27 and Tuesday, Jan. 3 for both Monday and Tuesday pick up.


WipterFest 5K
