

## **Fire Extinguishers**



A portable fire extinguisher can save lives and property by putting out a small fire or containing it until the fire department arrives; but portable extinguishers have limitations. Because fire grows and spreads so rapidly, the #1 priority for residents is to get out safely.

There are five classes of extinguishers:

Fire Class	Geometric Symbol	Pictogram	Intended Use	Mnemonic
A	Green Triangle	Ť	Ordinary solid combustibles	A for "Ash"
в	Red Square		Flammable liquids and gases	B for "Barrel"
с	Blue Circle		Energized electrical equipment	C for "Current"
D	Yellow Decagon (Star)	Ê	Combustible metals	D for "Dynamite"
к	Black Hexagon		Oils and fats	K for "Kitchen"

- When to Use: A portable fire extinguisher is used when the fire is confined to a small area, such as a wastebasket, and is not growing; everyone has exited the building; the fire department has been called or is being called; and the room is not filled with smoke.
- To operate a fire extinguisher, remember the word PASS
  - <u>**P**</u>ull the pin. Hold the extinguisher with the nozzle pointing away from you, and release the locking mechanism.
  - <u>Aim low.</u> Point the extinguisher at the base of the fire.
  - o **<u>S</u>**queeze the lever slowly and evenly.
  - **S**weep the nozzle from side-to-side.
- For the home, select a multi-purpose extinguisher (can be used on all types of home fires) that is large enough to put out a small fire, but not so heavy as to be difficult to handle.
- Choose a fire extinguisher that carries the label of an independent testing laboratory.
- Read the instructions that come with the fire extinguisher and become familiar with its parts and operation before a fire breaks out.
- Install fire extinguishers close to an exit and keep your back to a clear exit when you use the device so
  you can make an easy escape if the fire cannot be controlled. If the room fills with smoke, leave
  immediately.
- Know when to go. Fire extinguishers are one element of a fire response plan, but the primary element is safe escape. Every household should have a home fire escape plan and working smoke alarms.
