Winter Facts

December, January, February and March are peak months for home fire deaths.

During winter months, heating equipment is the leading cause of home fires. About two-thirds of home heating fire deaths are caused by portable or fixed space heaters.

Cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries overall.

Local Statistics

In 2015, VFD responded to a total of 290 fire incidents of which, 93 were building fires, 32 were as a result of cooking and 1 was a chimney fire.

Safety Tips

Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.

Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.

Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.

Always Remember

 Never use your oven to heat your home.

- 2. Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- **3.** Test smoke alarms at least once a month.
- **4.** Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
