Hoarding is defined as collecting or keeping large amounts of various items in the home due to a strong urge to save them. Hoarding also occurs when one experiences distress when they have to discard items.

Hoarding can be a fire hazard. Many occupants die in fires in homes occupied by hoarders.

In recent years, VFD has responded to many calls for help in which they recognize citizens living in these conditions. We have had at least one fire death in our community because of this lifestyle.



Dealing with Hoarders

- Be respectful and show concern for the person's safety.
- Match the language of the person. Avoid using derogatory terms, such as "junk", "trash", or "hoarding."
- Focus on safety

issues, such as fires, fall hazards, and avalanche conditions

Always Remember

- Responding firefighters can be put at risk due to obstructed exits. falling objects, and excessive fire loading that can lead to collapse.
- Hoarding makes fighting fires and searching for occupants far more difficult.
- Those living adjacent to an occupied structure can be quickly affected when a fire occurs, due to excessive smoke and fire conditions.
