Fire Safety for People with Disabilities

Disability Facts

More than 43 million Americans have a disability.

Each year there are approximately 700 home fires involving people with physical disabilities.

There are approximately 1,700 home fires involving people with mental disabilities yearly.

Kitchens and cooking areas are the primary areas where these fires start.

Disabilities can be temporary or permanent and considerations should be made for both.

Safety Tips

 It is safer for persons with disabilities to have their bedrooms located on the ground floor of homes and apartment buildings.

- Smoke alarms with a vibrating pad or flashing lights are available for people who are deaf or hard of hearing.
- Smoke alarms with a strobe light outside the home to catch the attention of neighbors,



and emergency call systems for summoning help, are also available.

- Plan your escape around your capabilities.
- Be sure to know two ways out of every room.

Always Remember

- Never isolate yourself.
 Speak with neighbors, friends and building managers about your disabilities and your home escape plan.
- Children and older adults with disabilities will require special assistance in the event of an emergency.
- Keep pathways free and clear of items that could cause tripping hazards or get in the way of wheelchair access.
- Practicing and Planning ahead can save your life.
