Young Firesetters

Firesetter Facts:

Between 2007 and 2011, an average of 49,300 fires involving playing with fire were reported to U.S. municipal fire departments per year.

These fires caused annual averages of 80 civilian deaths, 860 civilian injuries, and \$235 million in property damage.


Preschoolers and kindergartners are most likely to start these fires, typically by playing with matches and lighters; and are most likely to die in them.

Younger children were more likely to set fires in homes, while older children and teenagers are more likely to set fires outside.

Males were more likely to engage in fire-play than females, as 83% of home structure fires and 93% of outside or unclassified fires were set by boys when age was coded as a factor.

39% of home fires involving play began in a bedroom.

Lighters were the heat source in just over half (52%) of fires in homes involving play



Safety Tips

- Store matches and lighters out of children's reach and sight, up high, preferably in a locked cabinet or container.
- Never use lighters or matches as a source of amusement for chil-

dren; they may imitate you.

- Use only lighters designed with childresistant features.
- Closely supervise children, making sure that they are kept away from other fire sources, including lit candles, cigarettes, bonfires, and stoves
- Teach children that they must go tell a grown-up when matches or lighters are found. They are never to touch them.

Always Remember

- Lighters and matches are tools for adults, not toys.
- Fire is fast and can hurt as soon as it touches your skin.
