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DISCUSSION

Rob opened the meeting with an overview of the expectations for today. It plans to be a conversational presentation, led by AMS Planning and Research (Michele Walter). The next meeting was discussed and scheduled. Bob Goddard suggested the library board be invited to attend the Charrette. It was agreed by all to invite and provide enough time so everyone can attend.

The Conceptual Planning and Traffic | Transportation Charrette will be held on May 1-2, 2012.

The last two meetings were also scheduled:

Michele provided and overview of her scope of work to date and the Agenda for her presentation.

AMS conducted User Interviews and looked at the Current Activity Profile of Mathis Auditorium. In addition, local/area competition was also reviewed.

Michele indicated the facility will replace an existing facility and it is their recommendation the seat count should fall within the range of 1200-1500 seats. Note: This is not a latent increase in seat count. The seat count directly relates – exponentially - to cost of the project...not just Construction Budget but also Operating Plan. There doesn't appear to be a shift in population growth or propensity to the arts that warrant a 2,000 seat auditorium.

The difference between building an Municipal Auditorium for an Orchestra Performance and building a facility as an Orchestra's Home is based on many factors including, acoustics, program (practice rooms), etc. The current Valdosta Symphony Orchestra is part of the VSU Music Department. The new facility may accommodate the symphony, but it will not be this entity's permanent "home". VSU Representatives noted that anticipating the use of the facility, on occasion, by the Valdosta Symphony Orchestra is acceptable.

Michele noted there are lots of dance troupes and opportunities in the Community. Currently, we are in a season of culminating activities that requires many facilities including Mathis Auditorium and VHS Performing Arts Center. It is not anticipated that the new facility will be cheaper in cost to rent than the current arrangements at Mathis Auditorium.

The Design Team is not just looking to design a project for tomorrow, but looking at a projected look 50 years down the road. The team is addressing the issues and questioning each decision to be sure we do not grow out of what is built. The team, over the course of the design will be able to explain, "Why we did, What we did." We are using data compiled by the job team, using our professional experience, and looking at the data for Valdosta/Lowndes County in terms of population growth. Regardless of the size of the project, the citizens of Valdosta/Lowndes County (and the region) must go to the venue.

AMS does not believe in, "if you build it they will come." There is limited, additional national touring entertainment. The current model we have based on Valdosta/Lowndes County, is the model we will have. No "product" (or shows, events, etc.) is being added. Valdosta/Lowndes County is a good routing city/area, but the size of the community doesn't warrant adding new shows at this time – even with a new facility.

The Multipurpose Room does have a lot of demand and will be an integral part of the design conversations and considerations. It is used a significant amount of time. It should be separated, not necessarily stand alone, from

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the Auditorium – at minimum, isolated to allow for both areas to be used at the same time. These Multipurpose Room(s) could be downsized from larger room, or be converted to a small Black-Box Theater, say 150 seats.

AMS noted that there is nothing is particularly unusual about the use of Mathis. It IS consistent, where nationally there are events even through the week.

Michele reviewed the competition of surrounding facilities including venues in Thomasville, Georgia; Lakeland, Georgia; Monticello, Florida; and Madison, Florida.

The Lifestyle patterns are working against this project – even nationally. AMS noted that it is not getting easier to bring people to the Cultural Arts. Michele noted the venue must provide a social experience as well as cultural experience.

Building should be an object within a park, a gateway and gathering place.

Diversity of the uses will increase the quality of people. Kids are very important as they will be groomed to come when they are older.

Diversity of uses will make a huge impact on the community...the dance studios will get better artistically because of this facility.

AMS provided an overview of the Comparable Facilities Report (attached). This report will provide the Design Team relevant information as the process moves from planning to programming and design.
